Course Description:

This course emphasizes the concepts and competencies of information literacy, the evaluation of information, the organization of libraries, the classification of knowledge, and the basic skills of research. This course will introduce the student to library research resources such as electronic journals, full-text databases, the online catalog of print and electronic books, the Internet, and other library materials.

Course Objectives and student learning outcomes:

Students will learn information literacy skills to enhance lifelong learning and critical thinking. At the conclusion of this class, students will be able to:

- Perform self-directed library research.
- Demonstrate significant ability and proficiency in finding and evaluating research materials through the use of libraries and the Internet.
- Achieve basic competencies in Information Literacy, one area of the NLU General Education Core.
